The people gather in silence

Silence might not be your congregation's thing, so don't worry if people are restless. Consider Ash Wednesday and all of Lent a laboratory for your community to practice contemplation and see what happens.

Reflection:

We are often reminded of our mortality when there's tragedy. Ash Wednesday is a moment to consider the treasure of human life without drama or fear. Our service tonight opens us to the reality that we are children of this earth and the love of our covenant God cannot leave us.

A READING FROM PSALM 90:

Not the entire psalm, but highlights to ground the evening.

One: Our covenant God, you have been our home from one generation to another.

Many: Before the mountains were made or the land of this earth was born, from age to age, you are God.

One: You turn people to the earth and say, "Return, O children of earth."

Many: For a thousand years in your sight are like yesterday past, like a short night-watch:

One: You sweep them away like a dream; they fade away suddenly like the grass.

Many: In the morning, it is green and flourishes; in the evening, it is dried up and

withered.

One: So teach us to number our days so that we may cultivate hearts of wisdom.

All: Fill us with your unfailing love in the morning so we can sing for joy and be glad

all of our days.

GREETING

One: The Lord be with you Many: And also with you.

PRAYER WELCOME

If your community would respond better with a welcome and greeting at the top of the service, feel free to make that change. If Ash Wednesday is new to your people, they may want some guidance as to how to think about the service.

READING 1: Joel 2.1-2, 12-17 or Isaiah 58.1-12 *If you don't follow the lectionary, exchange for whatever texts are meaningful.*

READING 2: Psalm 51 (reading responsively)

One: Have mercy on me, O God, according to your perfect love.

Many: In your great kindness, erase my mistakes.

One: Wash me completely of my sin,

Many: for I never forget my need for forgiveness.

One: Against you alone have I sinned; I've failed you,

Many: so you are justified to judge us.

One: You desire truth and integrity to the core; Many: therefore transform me from within.

One: Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; Many: Wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow.

One: Let me hear joy and gladness; let this crushed body rejoice.

Many: Forget my sins forever and erase all my mistakes.

One: Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew my spirit.

Many: Please don't throw me out or take your holy spirit from me.

One: Restore my joy and sustain my spirit.

Many: Deliver us from violence, O God of healing, and we will cheer for your deliverance.

One: Holy One, open my lips,

Many: and my mouth will sound your praise.

One: For you care nothing for sacrifices.

Many: What you love is a broken spirit ready to change.

One: You welcome a humble heart.

Many: So bless your covenant people in your good pleasure, and rebuild the walls of the Holy City.

Age to age your perfect grace


We are children of our planet

IMPOSITION OF ASHES Describe the process well and invite people to take their time. Other meaningful songs may be added for time.



Psalm 61




THE LORD'S PRAYER If you desire.
